#### DOUG

It Could've Been the World's Largest Potato, if Only It Were a Potato

A couple in New Zealand found a giant growth in their garden, named it Doug and applied to Guinness World Records. Then the results of a DNA analysis came in.

In August last year, while weeding a patch of garden behind their home in New Zealand, Colin and Donna Craig-Brown struck gold, or what seemed like the world's largest potato.

"I had a big hoe in my hand, and it went, 'clonk," said Mr. Craig-Brown, speaking by phone on Thursday from his farm near Hamilton, where a cow could be heard in the background. "I said to my wife, 'What the hell's that?"

Then, he said: "I got a great big four-pronged garden fork and laid into it, like an over-excited Viking warrior. I thrust my foot deep into the earth, dragged this thing out, kicking and screaming. It was the size of a rubbish bin lid."

They called it Doug.

Dreading the knock at the door: Parents of trans kids in Texas are terrified for their families

A judge halted a Feb. 22 directive that authorized child abuse investigations of parents who let their children medically transition genders. But Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton says they can continue.

The sticky note left on Amber Briggle's desk was scrawled with a name, a phone number and the words urgent and private.

When Briggle, a mother of two and a small-business owner in Texas, arrived at her office on Feb. 28, she felt sure she knew what the note meant: Another parent of a transgender child — perhaps

one who was under investigation by the state's protective services agency — was calling for guidance; Briggle has long been a prominent advocate for the rights of transgender children and their families. Briggle dialed the number, prepared to hear about a family in trouble. Then an investigator from Child Protective Services (CPS) answered, and she realized the family in trouble was her own.

Did scientists really quantum entangle tardigrades?

Physicists dismiss claim that the first multicellular organism has been entangled with a qubit. But what was the weird experiment?

In a pre-peer-reviewed paper recently released on ArXiv, a team of physicists claims to have done something extraordinary: place a tardigrade in a state of quantum entanglement with a pair of qubits.

According to the mind-bending weirdness of quantum physics, quantum entanglement means that two things or systems cannot be described separately.

How We Make Sense of Time

January 2022 arrives as our methods of keeping time feel like they are breaking. Calendar pages turn, yet time feels lost. In this year of all years, what does it mean for a year to be new?

Deep inside a mountain in West Texas, Alexander Rose has been working to build a clock with a pendulum that will tick for 10,000 years.

It is hundreds of feet tall, powered by the temperature difference between day and night, and synchronized by the solstice. The idea, said Mr. Rose, the executive director of the foundation behind it, is to help humans think about time well beyond our own lives. They call it the Clock of the Long Now.

The coronavirus pandemic has slowed installation, and it has also made time itself feel strange, going by both in a blur and horrifically slowly, he said.
